Professional Learning Networks or PLNs: Personalized networks created by educators to support professional development are known as professional learning networks or PLNs. To

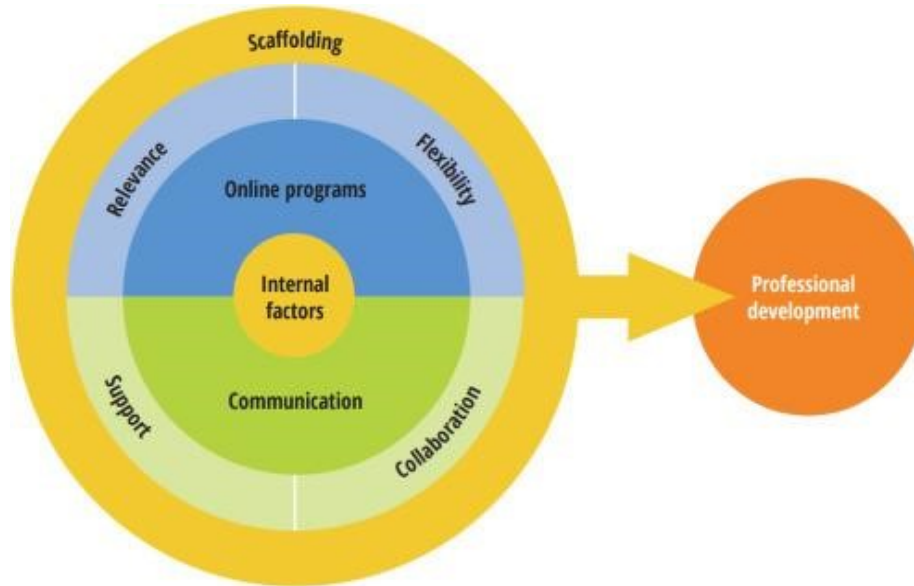
keep up with the newest developments and findings in education, these networks frequently entail following educators, thought leaders, and institutions on social media sites like LinkedIn and Twitter.
